
### **Desserts**



# **Fall Fishing For Smallmouth**

Below are some tips for catching Smallmouth Bass in Fall. Bass might not be as aggressive as they are in warmer months, but there are still ways to instigate a strike. The entire article is from Flylords and authored by Wesley Hodges. The full version can be found here.

### **Larger Streamers**

As the temperature dips down into the low 60s and 50s. Increase the size of the streamer you are fishing. Use something between 4 to 6 inches. As temperatures get cold, fish are eager to look for a larger meal. They want to fill up fast because there is less aquatic activity.


### **Crayfish Imitations**

A smallmouth's diet is around 70% crayfish. A heavy crayfish works well in a large pool with no current. In colder weather, fish tend to hang out near the bottom. If you can find structure in these deep pools, that is an even greater bonus.

### **Top Water Imitations**

As it gets colder, avoid top water flies. However, a random day that is a bit warmer, they can still be somewhat effective. The key is to see if you notice other baitfish at the surface. If you do, then fish the top. Typically in these instances, you want to strip the fly as fast as possible.





# **Proposed Flint River Wastewater Treatment Plant Concerns Aired**

Madison County residents attended a public hearing Oct. 14 in the Buckhorn Middle School cafeteria to voice concerns about a proposed wastewater treatment plant they say will affect the nearby Flint River.

The public hearing was organized by the <u>Alabama Department of Environmental Management</u> (ADEM) whether to approve a permit for a new wastewater treatment plant to be built by <u>Integra Water</u>. ADEM did not rule at the fact-gathering meeting.

Speakers overwhelmingly expressed concerns that the proposed treatment plant near Winchester Road will pollute the free-flowing stream, release odors, and cause property values to plummet, according to a story by AL.com's Megan Plotka. The story and photographs can be found here.

Speakers expressed concern about the creek they use for fishing, swimming, canoeing, and kayaking. "I want to see it's a great place to fish, you shouldn't put poop in it," 16-year-old Rowan Stafford said.

Integra Water CEO John McDonald addressed the ADEM panel about the facility permit Integra filed for permission to build in New Market's Berry Hill neighborhood. The subdivision has about 144 homes that are on a septic tank system.

Berry Hill residents Benjamin and Melissa Stafford started the "Keep the Flint River Clean" alliance to protect the neighborhood and local environment. They said they found out about the treatment center at the last possible moment on the last day they could submit public comment to ADEM, according to AL.com.

No elected official signed up to speak. "I think that the community engagement by our elected officials is insufficient, and I think that the requirement for any type of private development that impacts the greater community is inadequately represented," Benjamin Stafford said.

ADEM said citizens have 30 days to submit comment after a permit is submitted. ADEM does not have to actively notify affected residents and is only required to post notifications on its website.

"People are not happy, we understand that," an ADEM spokesperson told AL.com. "They found out late, but their finding out late did not preclude their ability to participate."

Organizers have contacted every level of representation, from their county commissioner to a U.S. senator, to help stop the plant. They say they all point their finger in another direction and say there is nothing they can do, AL.com reported.

Integra Water is in the project's planning and design phase. It has secured land, but must obtain a building permit from the Madison County Commission to build the facility, according to McDonald.

Advocates want to see change on a state level to allow for zoning restrictions for unincorporated land. Under the current state laws, property owners can build anything on their land in an unincorporated area. That means a wastewater treatment plant or landfill can be built right next door to a family home.

There are about 13 other wastewater treatment facilities on the Flint River. Integra Water reported that discharge does come from these facilities in its draft permit to build the New Market facility. Integra Water says that the liquid waste that it dumps into the river is highly treated, disinfected, and subject to strict state and federal environmental standards



# Fly Tying Bobbins 101

### What is a Bobbin?

- A bobbin holder (often just called a bobbin) is a critical tool that holds the thread spool.
- It provides thread control through its arms, which allow for adjusting thread tension, and its tube, which ensures smooth and accurate thread wrapping.
- This control enhances the quality, durability, and visual appeal of the tied fly.

### **Key Factors for Choosing a Bobbin**

- 1. Materials: The tube material is crucial.
  - Stainless steel is durable and generally less expensive.
  - Ceramic is often more durable and creates minimal friction, reducing the likelihood of thread fraying or breaking.
- 2. Length: Bobbin length (standard, midge, or longer) depends on the size of the flies being tied, with midge length preferred for smaller, intricate patterns.
- **3. Tube Diameter:** Standard or wide diameters are available, depending on the thickness of the thread or material (like yarn or heavy wire) being used.
- **4. Tension Adjustment:** Methods vary from simply squeezing the arms to advanced systems like disc drags or sliding bars, which offer more consistent pressure.
- **5. Price:** Cost is a consideration, but the most important factor is personal preference and finding a tool that makes the tying experience enjoyable.

## **Different Styles of Bobbin Holders**

The article categorizes bobbins into three main styles and provides examples:


- Basic Standard Bobbins: Good value options, often featuring stainless steel construction and glass inserts (e.g., Dr. Slick ECO Bobbin, J. Stockard Bobbin Stainless).
- Ceramics for Refinement: Higher quality due to ceramic pipe inserts for smoother thread flow and durability (e.g., Dr. Slick Ceramic Bobbin, JS Ceramic Bobbin).
- Mid-Range Marvels: Workhorse bobbins known for comfort, excellent tension control, and versatile use (e.g., Umpqua Dreamstream+ Bobbin, Loon Outdoors Ergo All Purpose Bobbin).
- Advanced Options with Adjustable Drags: Feature sophisticated mechanisms for precise, consistent tension control (e.g., Stonfo Elite Disc Drag Bobbin, Rite Bobbin, SMHAEN Bobbin).

### **FAQs**

**Purpose:** To hold the spool and control thread tension for smooth, even wraps.

**Bobbin Threader:** A tool with a fine wire loop used to easily guide the thread through the bobbin's narrow tube.

**Getting Started:** A bobbin holder is one of the three absolute necessities, along with a vise and scissors.
