TVFF Fly Tying Group

Due to the Thanksgiving holiday, there will only be one session in November. Larry Hice and Joe Tremblay have teamed up to demonstrate two great flies, a pheasant tail nymph and a bloodworm.

Frenchie Nymph:

While passing through Bristol, Virginia, Larry stopped by Mountain Sports Ltd. It's a fantastic outdoor shop and he visits the shop every time he's in the area. Through his frequent stops he's gotten to know the head fly fishing guide, Jimmy Cheers.



On a recent visit, Larry found Jimmy tying a bead head pheasant tail type fly on a size #18 nymph hook for an upcoming guide trip on the South Holston River. Jimmy indicated that frenchie nymphs were a good substitute for a conventional pheasant tail and much easier to tie. Although they can be tired in a variety of colors, according to Jimmy the secret sauce is a brown UV Ice Dub collar.

Bloodworm:

On a recent outing to a small local pond, Joe discovered the fish had developed a severe case of lock jaw. After having every dry fly in his box ignored, he decided to tie on a dropper. Not a fan of midges, he was amazed to see how eagerly the bream were taking a bloodworm and now wants to share his newfound respect for the midge.

They are an important fly since they are the start of the emerging form of a midge which is the only fly to hatch 365 days per year.



Bloodworms are blood red in color and are a great fly for all species. They get their color from the oxygen and hemoglobin held within their bodies. Bloodworms should be fished deep which is where the natural bloodworm will be found.

All are welcomed! Fly tying equipment is available for new tyers. Come and discover the joy of catching fish on a fly you tied or even designed. Join us for 2 hour sessions held on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of the month at 7 PM.






Fill-A-Box

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FFI's Top 10 Photo Tips for Great Fishing Photos



FFI'S TOP 10 TIPS FOR GREAT FISHING PHOTOS

The following are some tips for taking better fly fishing photos.

What makes a good and bad photo is admittedly subjective. This document has been developed to provide you some tips regarding what photos FFI is looking for use in our messaging. We are most interested in photos that express the spirit and values of FFI and capture what we all love about fly fishing.

These tips are intended to offer only quick advice, and in no way represent in-depth instructions. We'd recommend doing online research or taking classes if you want to take the next steps.

We are assuming that you already know the basics — how to focus, set the exposure, and operate the other basic controls on your camera.

Here are ten tips for you to consider.

TELL ME A STORY

FFI considers fishing the experience more than just the fish.

Therefore, the best photos aren't just of someone holding out a fish, grip 'n' grin style. Sure that makes a fine memory, but we've all seen lots of those. The best photos, in our opinion, tell a visual story — or even better, more than one story. And it doesn't have to show fish or fishing to be a great fishing photo!

2. GO TO THE LIGHT

Set that alarm, or stay out through sunset — early and late light typically offers the best photo opportunities. Just interesting midday light can work, certainly, but great or dynamic light will greatly help you get a great shot.







3. A LITTLE MYSTERY

Another characteristic of a great image is having some sense of mystery, or making you wonder if there is more to the story. What happened next? What's happening here? What are they fishing for? A little mystery makes a photo more appealing.







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4. RULE OF THIRDS

Imagine your viewfinder is divided into thirds, vertically and horizontally. Try to place your main subject at one of the four points of intersection or on one of the lines that result from this division. Typically that means that you don't center the subject. The subject may be a person, a boat, a fish (focus on the eye!), or anything else you find of interest. If you have more than one subject, place each at a different intersection point. Some modern cameras and phones have an option to show the thirds grid in the viewfinder if you need more help.





5. PLANES, TRAINS, AND RODS & REELS

Consider having gear in the shot, or fly boxes, or forms of transportation, not just fish and people. It can add more to the storyline.





6. THE PILLARS

Conservation, education, community: these are the FFI pillars, and if a photo can capture and/or convey one or more of these, great! Keep in mind it's less important to literally show 'conservation' versus having a photo that is dynamic and interesting, and maybe more subtly suggests conservation. And 'community' could easily be captured in an interaction among fly fishers, tiers, or casters — no actual fish or fishing in the shot at all.







7. KEEP EM WET

FFI's official position is to follow the principles of the "Keep Em Wet" philosophy when taking fish photos. Basically keep the fish in or near the water as much as possible, handling the fish gently, and be quick on your photos. Get more info at https://www.keepemwet.org/







8. SHOOTING TYING

Like fishing photos, the best tying photos have more than just a closeup of the fly. Try interesting light, get people in them, give it some context, tell a story, show us what makes fly tying fun and interesting!







10. BIGGER IS BETTER

Most phones take images with large enough resolution to be usable for the web or social media (assuming you have the phone's settings on highest quality). Generally, photos that are at least a few megabytes in file size are one reliable indication they are higher resolution. Modern phones can produce great photos, but may struggle in low light. Open up a photo from your phone on your computer and you'll probably see the difference. Certainly using a "real" camera gets better quality, especially for print and desktop screens, but phone cameras do get better and better.

Oh, and you can't just "add" resolution to a small photo — you can downsize, but not upsize. Photoshop seems to give you an option to do that, but the original photo out of your camera has a certain amount of information, you can't just add to it and expect to maintain clarity, etc.

Most importantly — have fun out there!


