Fly tying sessions will be conducted at Faith Presbyterian Church, Room 201, at 7 p.m.

September 8, 7 PM
San Juan Worm – Fred Kaufmann

Cost: \$2.00 in person

Easy to tie and effective fly. Name originates from the San Juan River in New Mexico where the fly was invented.

Materials:

Hook: Size 14 – 18 scud or emerger hook

Body: Chenille Head: Bead



September 22, 7 PM
Clouser Minnow – Connor Baker

Cost: \$2.00 in person

Classic fly pattern developed by Bob Clouser. Probably one of the most effective streamers. Works great in salt water, for bass, and for trout.

Materials

Hook: #1/0 Tiemco 811S

Thread: White 3/0

Eyes: Red lead eyes (medium)
Belly hair: White bucktail
Center Flash: Krystal Flash
Top Hair: Chartreuse bucktail
Other: Gel super glue, bodkin








To the left is a rainbow trout TVFF member Greg Bayuga caught on the Elk River during a float trip! Nice rainbow!

Our August speaker, Mayfly Project director Jeremiah Russell, explained how the new program (in north Alabama) aims to help foster children through an introduction to fly fishing. Dr. Russell is the administrator of a private school in Huntsville and organized the Mayfly Project that recruits adults who mentor children through fly fishing. The Mayfly Project is a 501(c)(3) organization that aims to support children in foster care not only through fly fishing but also by introducing them to their local water ecosystems.




Hopefully, it will connect them to a rewarding hobby, Dr. Russell said. "Above all it teaches friendship," he said. Dr. Russell said the Mayfly Project will begin mentoring in 2023. 
















Smithsonian Magazine - Largest Freshwater Fish Caught in Cambodia

The world's largest freshwater fish, a 13-foot-long, 661-pound stingray, has been discovered in the Mekong River in Cambodia. Scientists say the animal is a hopeful sign for the river, which faces threats from human encroachment and development, damming and climate change, per a statement from FISHBIO, a fisheries and environmental consulting company.

The giant freshwater stingray (Urogymnus polylepis) was caught on June 13 by a local fisherman, who alerted scientists from the Wonders of the Mekong project, a joint Cambodian-U.S. research and outreach initiative.

Globally, about 70 percent of giant freshwater fish are endangered, Hogan tells the AP. Many of these species have relatively long lives and can take a long time to mature, so if they're fished before reaching that maturity, they don't have a chance to reproduce. Many also require large areas to survive and grow. Stingrays take up to four years to reach sexual maturity and are relatively slow-growing for the batoid family of fishes, which includes relatives like sharks.

The Mekong River, which runs through China, Myanmar, Laos, Thailand, Cambodia and Vietnam, is home to several giant fish species. This particular section—south of Stung Treng in northeastern Cambodia—may be an important breeding ground for the stingrays; four females of the species, including this one, have been caught in the area recently, per the AP. Last month, a group of local fishermen caught a 400-pound female stingray in the same stretch, writes Mongabay's Carolyn Cowan.

The newly discovered stingray breaks the previous freshwater fish record held by a 645-pound Mekong giant catfish captured in 2005.

Hatch Magazine - Catching a Pacific Sailfish on the Fly

How would you like to cast your fly to a fish that might be longer than your fly rod? That's right, longer than your 9-foot fly rod. If you want an adrenaline rush almost equal to landing on an aircraft carrier, you might want to try a pacific sailfish on fly. You will be close up and personal with your adversary and it's not as difficult as you might believe. In more than 40 years of fly fishing for Pacific sail, I've helped scores of people catch their first. My first was at Club de Pesca de Panama, now called Tropic Star Lodge, in 1964.

Picture this scenario: The Ocean, glassy smooth, as the Pacific often is. The sky, gray and almost threatening, a thunderstorm brewing on the horizon. Your crew has rigged three softhead teasers with the belly-strip from a bonito sewn inside. Suddenly, the tip of a bill appears behind the far teaser. You feel this in your gut; a sailfish is checking out your teaser.

Your captain or mate sees it first and shouts, "He's coming, he's coming!" Or, "VELA! VELA!" – "SAIL! SAIL!"

Your David/Goliath adventure is about to begin. In about three seconds, all hell is going to break loose. The sail will grab the teaser, but the mate will snatch it away. Two or three times. Now the sail is mad as hell. That's when you drop that popper three feet behind its tail.




Casting for Fly Fishing Class

Tennessee Valley Fly Fishers is offering Casting for Fly Fishing class on Saturday September 17th from 9:15 AM to Noon at the Mark Russell Recreation Center, 429 Taylor Rd, Huntsville, AL.

We will start with a classroom session to provide an overview and to introduce concepts and terminology. Then you will learn how to tie a couple of useful knots. This will be followed by a casting lesson and time to practice. Fly rods will be provided. The class is free.



The casting class will be held outdoors, weather permitting, indoors otherwise. Dress for the weather. A hat, and sunglasses or other eye protection are recommended. Casting for Recovery Fly Boxes




