




June 18th is Go Fishing Day





A day on the Elk by Chuck Gibb

It was threatening to rain but we said "what the hell" and set out anyway to float the Elk. It sprinkled on us a little as we left the meeting place in Fayetteville. On the way to the river I learned that David Darnell had grown up here right in this beautiful country of central Tennessee. Having traveled pretty much everywhere in America, I remain convinced there is not a more beautiful area in our country.

We arrived at the Elk just as one canoe was putting in. The river was low, maybe 80 CFS. By then the weather had cleared.



It was a spectacular clear, bright spring day on this wonderful little river. I have fished it since the early 60s but not often and mostly waded at the dam and bridge.

I told David of a time when my hair was brown and my eyesight perfect when I fished with my old fishing buddy Dick Schock (some of you oldtimers may remember Dick). I had laid down on a log crossing the river to rest and I heard a commotion on the hill side. As I watched a buck with a huge rack came down the hill side and into the river. He stood there, as the morning mist swirled around him then looked down the river where I lay, lowered his head to drink. It was a scene I will never forget. He looked again in my direction and ambled back up the hillside. That is what fishing, being out there, is all about.



David set up several rods for streamer and nymph fishing. We took one at the first bend and it was a beautiful little brown. Fishing just got better and I took about 20 fish. One hole we just quit because every cast we seemed to catch one. Nymphing was not as productive but more fun. We spent more time BSing than fishing but then that's half the fun.

As we arrived to Ferris Creek we both expressed concern over the impact of the water cress farms and the massive discharges from their fields. Somehow I can't believe it is good for our river. At one point yellow muck colored the river for a long way. I hope the authorities are paying attention. But below the muck the water cleared and we caught fish again. David is a perfect guide, accomplished outdoors-man and a lot of fun. It was a great day of fishing...and catching.

Sharp trip to Donavan Lakes - 2-6 May

Long before I joined the club, Everett Sharp, a long time member, has been organizing a spring bass trip to Donavan Lakes in Marion Alabama. My first trip in May of 2011 left such a deep impression that I made myself promised to return as often as possible. I kept that promise by returning at least once a year since.

As usual, Donavan did not disappoint. The facilities were great as always, the weather was near perfect and the bass were hungry. Donavan is a magical place where anglers often catch their personal best. Bass under 3 pounds are considered small, 4 to 5 pound bass are common and many of past attendees have netted bass over 8 pounds. At Donavan, all bass 3 pounds and over must be released and 3 of the 8 lakes are catch and release only. To my knowledge, no fish have ever been kept during these trips. Fish are photographed, weighed and released unharmed for other anglers to enjoy.


Everyone caught fish in excess of 4 pounds this year, with Roger and Wayne catching their biggest bass ever. There was no shortage of "fish tales", especially tales of "the one that got away", to be told on the breezeway during the midday break or around the dinner table. It's absolutely amassing how much a fish grows from the time it takes the fly till the time it gets away.

You have to be up to it though, the routine is grueling. Up at 4:30 am for a quick breakfast, fish till ~10 am, eat lunch at noon, rest and/or relate embellished accounts of the morning's (or past) conquest till ~3, then back on the water till dark, eat a light dinner accompanied with the usual stories, finally bed ~ 10 pm for 5 to 6 hours of sleep before doing it all over the next day. It's a tough, demanding routine but <u>someone has to do it.</u>

Bucketmouth Quest – May by Joe Tremblay

Prime bass season had finally arrived! The weather looked promising; the bass are off their beds and feeding. Bill and I only were able to take advantage of the great conditions Friday afternoon and Saturday morning before Mother's Day demanded our return. Bill landed several nice fish Friday evening before a really big bass,

well schooled in the art of avoiding capture, swam directly towards the boat preventing a good hook set. This was not the first time that bass were reported to have employed this tactic. Many of the members who attended the April Club trip and the May Sharp trip reported similar occurrences. Looks like some of the bass may be getting wise to fly fishers.

Schooled or not, bass sometimes either forget or get careless. Such was the case on Saturday morning. A bucketmouth had the misfortune of finding the business end of my chartreuse stealth bomber. This fish also charged the boat, but only after the hook was firmly set, bending my rod to the breaking point as it passed under the boat before changing course. Dick Curtis, my bass mentor, told me of times when bass not only go under the boat but leap clear of the water on the opposite side. This bass, however, returned before clearing the water with a fantastic jump to the delight of both Bill and I. As I often do, I misjudge its size of the fish when it cleared the water, believing it to be 6lbs +/-, but after several more trips under and around the boat, the digital scale put it at 7lbs 6oz.






Larry Hice and I returned the 20th – 22nd for another go. Conditions had changed, a cold front moved through Friday and constant wind made fishing challenging except for the early morning hours. But even so, Larry hooked and landed a nice 6lbs 7oz bucketmouth along with several other nice fish. Most of my fish were small by comparison, but one in particular deserves a mention, a 15" bass that tipped the scale at just under 3lbs. It resembled a football and fought like 5 pounder. I can only imagine the fun of catching this fish in a few years.

I recently started using Fast Snaps instead of tying my fly on. Fast Snaps make changing flies fast and easy, and you don't shorten your tippet every time you change flies. Fast Snaps offer yet another advantage. Check out the Fast Snap in the corner of the fish's mouth. The hook was never in play, only the Fast Snap. Who would have believed you could catch a bass on such a small "hook"?

May was a great month to be on Donavan Lakes.





Federation of Fly Fishers Code of Angling Ethics

- > Fly anglers understand and obey laws and regulations associated with the fishery.
- Fly anglers believe fly fishing is a privilege and a responsibility. Fly anglers conserve fisheries by limiting their catch.
- >Fly anglers do not judge fellow anglers and treat them as they would expect to be treated.
- > Fly anglers respect the waters occupied by other anglers so that fish are not disturbed.
- When fishing from a watercraft, fly anglers do not crowd other anglers or craft or unnecessarily disturb the water.
- Fly anglers respect other angling methods and promote this Code of Angling Ethics to all anglers.
